What is CoderDojo?

CoderDojo is a global movement of free, open coding clubs (Dojos) for young people aged 7 to 17 (Ninjas), where they can explore technology with the support of their fellow Ninjas and volunteer mentors. CoderDojo's mission is to give young people around the world the opportunity to learn to code in a social and safe environment. CoderDojo is part of the Raspberry Pi Foundation, a UK-based charity. The movement was founded by James Whelton and Bill Liao in Cork in 2011. Now, only eight years later, CoderDojo's open-source model has helped the movement spread around the world; there are over 2000 Dojos spread across 100 countries, and people start new Dojos every day. Coollest Projects

Coollest Projects is a world-leading technology fair for young people. At Coollest Projects, young makers share their projects with fellow creators and the public, and they explore each other's work. Outstanding entries can win awards in different categories. All Coollest Projects events are free to enter and free for young people to attend, giving more people the opportunity to become inspired to create with technology. Three Coollest Projects events took place in 2019 which were led by the Raspberry Pi Foundation:

- Coollest Projects International in Dublin, Ireland on 5 May
- Coollest Projects UK in Manchester on 2 March
- Coollest Projects USA in Santa Ana, California on 23 March

Code Club

Code Club is a global network of volunteers and educators who run coding clubs for young people aged 9-13. Their mission is to put a Code Club in every community in the world, and to give every child the skills, confidence, and opportunity to change their world. A core belief of the Code Club movement is that all children should have the opportunity to learn to code, no matter who they are or where they come from. Like CoderDojo, Code Club is part of the Raspberry Pi Foundation. There are currently over 13,000 clubs in over 160 countries, supporting over 180,000 young people learning to code each week.
